**Life Aboard the Sparrow-Hawk**

In 1626, a group of English colonists boarded a small ship named *Sparrow-Hawk* and set sail for Virginia. The ship went off course and was wrecked in Pleasant Bay. Its remains are on display at the Cape Cod Maritime Museum in Hyannis. The people on board included men, women and children, with a captain, crew and passengers.

We will learn about what each person on board did while they were at sea.

**Cape Cod Shipbuilding**

People have been building water craft on Cape Cod for thousands of years beginning with log boats and continuing up to today's sail and power boats. We will examine different materials for boat building, and various forms of propulsion.

You will be constructing your own clipper ship as well as a shadow box of a ship to show various items throughout the ship.
