## From the Director

### First Impressions

Chatham was buzzing when I arrived at the Atwood House in mid-August. The constant line of cars and the flood of pedestrians crossing back and forth made negotiating Main Street a challenge and I quickly learned routes that avoided the busiest parts of town. The beach at the Oyster Pond just up Stage Harbor Road from the museum was full of visitors enjoying a string of beautiful days from the time I passed on my way to the Atwood House in the morning until I drove by in the evening. Shops and restaurants all were operating at full speed.

Then the week before Labor Day the pace slackened. The buzzing began to shift from human voices to the sound of the crickets in the tangle of vegetation behind the museum leading down to the Mill Pond. With families heading home for the start of the school year our visitor numbers trailed off a bit and the demographics shifted. I heard fewer feet running across the floor of the gallery over my office and fewer enthusiastic calls of "What's that?" coming from the tool room. But every day that we were open during September there were plenty of cars in the lot and the license plates indicated that our visitors came from near and far. Comments overheard in the gift shop and recorded in our guest book registered delight with the museum and the great tours our docents offered. It seemed a shame to close our doors for the season but by Columbus Day weekend the stream of visitors had slowed to a trickle.

In the weeks ahead we will open for special events like Black Friday when you can stop in for a tour of the Atwood House and take advantage of the shop for holiday gift and book purchases and for our traditional Hearth Warming celebration on December 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup>. There are several terrific lectures coming up and, as in years past, we will host a film screening as our contribution to Chatham's 2013 First Night Celebration. Behind the scenes work will continue on our amazing collections and next year's exhibition. I'm still learning my way around, still meeting members for the first time, and still trying to get a handle on everything this wonderful organization does. And I am constantly finding new reasons to feel very lucky that I have been given the opportunity to be a part of it.

he Sunday colonial events were enjoyed by all ages. Pigs, sheep, and goats provided a barnyard scent to the activities. The spinning and basket making were especially fascinating to many visitors. Children had the opportunity to try out writing with a quill pen as well as basic weaving. Samples from the open hearth cooking were enjoyed by guests, and talks and demonstrations about period clothing construction were quite interesting to visitors. A lecture on herbs was of particular interest. Children's games included graces, hopscotch, cat's cradle, cup ball, and hoop

rolling. Especially enjoyable was the strolling musician who played several different flutes or fifes. The display of early medical instruments and the explanations of their uses were of interest to others. The variety of activities provided something for everyone; the weather was great, and it was fun to be outdoors.

## Some Museum Acquisitions in 2011 and 2012


The Atwood House Museum through its parent organization, the Chatham Historical Society, has been fortunate to receive some very interesting donations during the year 2012. Items accessioned this year include a kindling basket, owned by Azebah Collins Atwood (1806 – 1886), daughter of Sears Atwood, grand-daughter of Joseph Atwood and Deborah Sears. This basket was a gift from Camille Atwood who summered for many years, at the Atwood Farm, on Stage Harbor Road.

Model of the Flying Cloud clipper ship

This model of the clipper ship Flying Cloud was donated to the society in memory of Sven A. Vaule by the Vaule family. The Flying Cloud was considered to be the masterpiece of her designer, Donald D. McKay, foremost marine architect and shipbuilder of his time. She was launched in East Boston in 1851 and quickly acquired a reputation for her speed. Within six weeks of her launching, she sailed from New York and made San Francisco, around Cape Horn, in 89 days, 21 hours. At the time this trip commonly required an average of 200 days. Her captain on that trip was Josiah Perkins Cressy.

## Costumes and Textiles

he Costumes and Textiles Depart-I ment collects and preserves many kinds of fabric items, including clothing, linens, quilts, flags, dolls, and dolls' clothes. The department has received gifts from many sources. Two groups of recent donations are highlighted here.

This 1948 U.S. Army Officer's Dress Uniform belonged to society member David R. Oakley, and was worn on active duty from 1953 - 1955. The donation includes the jacket, jacket belt, "pink trousers", trousers belt, hat, Captain's silver shoulder bars, shoulder badge signifying 2nd Army, ribbon bar signifying Korean War Service, National Defense medal with ribbon signifying Korean War Service, rifle insignia, and two lapel insignias 1948 U.S. Army Officer's Dress Uniform signifying ordinance corps.

The department is very interested in acquiring uniforms from other branches of the services and other time periods. If anyone has a uniform that needs a new home, please consider donating it to the Atwood House Museum.

During 2011 and 2012, Costumes and Textiles has received a wonderful collection of items from Ginny Nickerson, which were worn by various members of that branch of the Nickerson family. Among these are a woman's swimming suit from the era 1915 - 1925, and a wide variety of children's garments including infants' items, blouses for small boys, and dresses for little girls and young girls. The era for the infants and children's ranges from the early 1900s to about 1920.

## New materials for the Archives

ate this summer, we received sev-✓ eral boxes of materials belonging to George Crowell and Clara Crowell.

Among those papers were documents that told the story of Clara's activities during WWII. One of her most important contributions was shepherding the formation and obtaining official support for a USO chapter in Chatham. The bills, receipts, and reports to the national office are significant in that they show how much the USO meant to the servicemen and greater still the economic value the activity was to the Town of Chatham.
