



From the Director

eading The Atwood Log you have probably come across the phrase

"Bringing History to Life." It's a kind of credo that we believe captures the gist of what we try to achieve through our programs at the Atwood House Museum. Several years ago when the Society set out to recognize members of our community who have made substantive contributions to our understanding of, and appreciation for, the history of Chatham we incorporated the phrase in the name of the award we have now given four times.

The most obvious interpretation of what it means to bring life to history might be the creative act of instilling the sometimes dry facts - the names, dates, and events - that populate dusty volumes with vibrancy and relevance. This year the Society explored a related but distinct interpretation of the phrase when it chose to give the Bringing History to Life Award to Brad and Mike Pease.

Brad and Mike have built an enviable reputation in the wooden boat world with their work at Pease Boat Works & Marine Railway on Chatham's Mill Pond. Their work includes, in the guise of maintenance, the preservation of older boats and the design and construction of handsome new ones. They are known for their commitment to traditional craftsmanship and their ability to maintain the high standards of their chosen profession while developing a mastery of contemporary construction techniques and materials. We felt they were more than deserving of the award because through their work they are keeping a part of the history of our town alive, adding a new chapter to the story of boatbuilding in Chatham.

Giving the award to Brad and Mike this year fit perfectly with our summer exhibition about sailing in Chatham and the work of F. Spaulding Dunbar. The Pease Boat Works & Marine Railway is on the site where Spaulding and Doris Dunbar relocated their yard in the late 1930s. It was here that the Monomoy and earliest Whistler one-designs were built. Today the visitor to the Mill Pond not only sees where Chatham boats were built in the past, but where they continue to be built today. Several weeks ago, when participants in our summer camp took a day off from their work with Dave Archibald building a 10' Spaulding Dunbar skiff to visit Brad and Mike, they spent a wonderful morning not observing history, but experiencing it, an opportunity we all will have during the Museum's Dunbar Celebration on Saturday, August 17th. I hope to see you there.

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

Town Supports Chatham Nautical Chart Initiative

he Museum received good news in May when citizens at Town Meeting voted to allocate funds generated under the Community Preservation Act for the project conserve and digitize a group of nautical charts in the Historical Society collection. The collection is among the most compelling and significant of the Society's holdings. It includes charts describing oceans and landforms around the globe. Many of them bear annotations recording their use during the period of the town's preeminence in the history of international sea trade. Not only conveying information about the state of knowledge at the time they were created, they often inspire appreciation as objects of beauty. A significant number can be linked with known Chatham sea captains who recorded specific journeys on them. Captains Gersham Jones, Charles W. Jones, Reuben Eldredge, Simeon Taylor, John Taylor, and Charles W. Hamilton all have been identified as the ship masters who used specific charts in the collection. In addition to their value as individual objects, the charts also supplement other materials in the Society's publically accessible collections.
